Funds to provide more playground equipment and larger general areas (lunchroom) to address need for spacing and positive, frequent and equitable physical activity.

NWACA and Responsive Ed as a whole has developed a reputation for being high on punishment and coercive management rather than instructional leadership. Many adults on campus have an attitude that they are to be obeyed and respected no matter what, which lends to a leader style that demands to be worshiped rather than a man or woman who truly cares for the well-being of the student. Strong leaders do not have many major issues with their followers. To those leaders on campus who are always in strife with someone, whether it be a parent, student, or fellow peer - those individuals are not following best-practices of leadership. In turn, those individuals are creating a culture of abuse that is toxic and detrimental to learning. A mediocre teacher that understands the true meaning of leadership will always be more effective than a great teacher who only manages by strict adherence to rules. Having a love affair with rule following is not great leadership. Obedience is a heart attitude not a behavior discipline and understanding these core tenants of leadership are lacking severely on campus.

While I have a kid who has immunity related issues, the highest concern that I have is 'Safe and Healthy' classrooms. I can share a real world example. Usually, when my kids go to school, every winter, they would fall sick with one or the other, like, flu, cold, cough, sore throat, etc. But, this year, while they were at home, by God's grace, they did not have any of those issues past winter. It is very evident that School becomes a platform where kids are exposed to innumerable germs and bacteria that are good and bad for them. So, I strongly believe that a Safe and Healthy classroom is of foremost importance. As parents ourselves, let us look for ways to get our kids in a safe and healthy school. Net net, sanitary measures to protect the school environment should be upgraded and intact for the future.

Teachers and the Quality of Education - It was very obvious that, not just us, most of us in work and education were not fully prepared for this kind of pandemic and we had lots of glitches in getting quality education for our kids. The teachers did their best, but still there were shortfalls.

Our children deserve an in person education but how can we as parents feel comfortable sending them to school if the adults who are around them won't choose to do their part to keep them safe? What we like about the classical education approach is that it is based on science and facts. We need to apply "real" science and "real" facts to our classroom environment and make it the safest it can be. For staff members who refuse to vaccinate they should wear masks at all times to protect the vulnerable students who cannot get vaccinated and those who are immune compromised and might not ever be able to take the vaccine because of their current health status.

Besides vaccinated staff we need access to more sinks to wash hands. Mask wearing at school should still be continued as it has been proven time and time again how effective they are.
